Our Victory - Humanity and Divinity Combined

Quote -

"It is at an immense cost that we have been placed on the high vantage ground where we can be liberated from the bondage of sin, which has been wrought by the fall of Adam. . . . Never can we under-stand the value of the human soul until we realize the great sacrifice made for the redemption of the soul upon Calvary. Adam's sin in Eden plunged the human race into hopeless misery. But in the scheme of salvation a Way (John 14:6) has been provided for all to escape if they comply with the requirements.

A second probation has been granted by the sacrifice of the Son of God. We have a battle to fight, but we can come off victor through the merits (worthiness) of Christ's blood.

"For in that He died, He died unto sin once; but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God . . . !"

Romans 6:10-11, 6:1-6*

God saw that it was impossible for us to overcome and gain the victory in our own strength. The race has ever been growing weaker in every succeeding generation since the fall . . . and without the help of Christ we cannot resist the evil of intemperance. How thankful we should be that we have a Saviour and that He consented to lay off His royal robes and leave the royal throne, and to clothe His divinity with humanity and become a Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. . . .

After His baptism, He was led by the Spirit into the wilderness and was tempted of the devil. Christ commenced the work of redemption just where the ruin began, and the future welfare of the world depended on that battle fought by the Prince of Life in the wilderness.

Thanks be to God that He came off victorious, <u>passing over the same ground</u> where Adam fell and redeeming Adam's disgraceful failure. Satan left the field of battle a conquered foe. **This victory is an assurance to us** that through Divine help we may come off victorious in our behalf (Desire of Ages, p.160-161) on our own account in the conflict with the enemy . . .

Quote -

"Like the twelve apostles, the seventy disciples whom Christ sent forth later received supernatural endowments as **a seal** of their mission. When their work was completed, they returned with joy, saying, "Lord (*Adoni* – Sovereign King), even the devils are subject unto us through Thy name." Jesus answered, *Why are you surprised* . . . for I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven." Luke 10:17-18.

Henceforth Christ's followers are to look upon Satan as a conquered foe. Upon the cross, Jesus was to gain the victory for them (Romans 6:10); that victory He desired (desires) them to accept as their own. "Behold," He said (says) . . . "I give unto you _____ (your name) power* to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy: and nothing shall by any means hurt you." Luke 10:19.

Quote -

"Satan left the field as a conquered foe. Our Saviour passed over the ground and was victor. He was fainting on the field of battle. There was no bosom to cradle His head, and no hand to pass over His brow. Angels came and ministered unto Him. <u>Just such help we may claim</u>. Christ saw it was impossible for man to overcome in his own behalf. *So* He came to bring moral power to man. This is our only hope.

Victory Through Christ -

We see the importance of overcoming appetite. Christ overcame, and we may obtain the victory as Christ did (by faith in the promises of God). He passed over the ground, and there is victory for man. There is hope for the most hopeless, in Christ. "Can the Ethiopian change his skin, or the leopard his spots? Then may ye also do good, that are accustomed to do evil." "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the LORD: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." There we have the rich promises of God. **What did Christ come here for?** To represent the Father. What a heart of love and sympathy! He came to bring Eternal Life (I John 5:10-11), *and* to break every band (yoke – Isaiah 10:27). When God gave His Son, He gave all heaven *in that one gift*. He could give no more.

When we think of the conflict before us and the great work that we must do, we tremble. But we may remember that our Helper is Almighty. We may feel strong in His strength. We may unite our ignorance to His wisdom, our feebleness to His might, our weakness to His unfailing strength (I Corinthians 1:29-31). Through Him we may be "more than conquerors!"

Through the power of appetite (the fleshly desire for that which our God has forbidden) Satan has gained control of men and women. How difficult it is to obtain the victory over appetite when once it is established. How important that parents bring their children up with <u>pure tastes and unperverted appetites</u>. Parents should ever remember that upon them rests the responsibility of training their children in such a way that they will have moral stamina to resist the evil that will surround them when they go out into the world. {RH, July 9, 1901 par. 7}

Here we see that Satan's first attempt was upon the point of appetite, and he seeks to overcome Him. But Christ was to pass over the ground where Adam fell and redeem his disgraceful fall. He met Satan every time with, "It is written . . . not with ink, nor on tables of stone, but in the fleshy tables of hearts renewed . . . Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every Word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" (ref: II Corinthians 3:1-3). – 9MR p.231

Quote -

"In contemplating the incarnation of Christ in humanity, we stand baffled before an unfathomable mystery, that the human mind cannot comprehend. The more we reflect upon it, the more amazing does it appear. How wide is the contrast between the divinity of Christ and the helpless infant in Bethlehem's manger!

How can we span the distance between the mighty God and a helpless child? And yet the Creator of worlds, He in Whom was the fullness of the Godhead bodily (ref: Desire of Ages, p.160-161), was manifest in the helpless babe in the manger. Far higher than any of the angels, equal with the Father in dignity and glory, and yet wearing the garb of humanity!

Divinity and humanity were mysteriously combined, and **man and God became One** (John 17:21). It is in this union that we find the hope of our fallen race. Looking upon Christ in humanity, we look upon God, and see in Him the brightness of His glory, the express image of His person (ST July 30, 1896). {5BC 1130.5}

"The Saviour took upon Himself the infirmities of humanity and lived a sinless life, that men might have no fear that because of the weakness of human nature they could not overcome. Christ came to make us "partakers of the divine nature," and His Life declares that humanity, combined with divinity, does not commit sin. - {MH 181.2}

Quote -

"Apart from divine power, no genuine reform can be effected. Human barriers against natural and cultivated tendencies are but as the sandbank against the torrent. Not until the Life of Christ becomes a vitalizing power in our lives can we resist the temptations that assail us from within and from without . . . By becoming One with Christ, man is made free. Subjection to the will of Christ means restoration to perfect manhood."

Quote -

"As a result of Adam's disobedience, every human being is a transgressor of the law, sold under sin. Unless he repents and is converted, he is under bondage to the law (Romans 6:23), serving Satan, falling into the deceptions of the enemy, and bearing witness against the precepts of Jehovah.

But by perfect obedience to the requirements of the law, man is justified* (Romans 5:1). Only through faith in Christ is such obedience possible.
